Once again, I am pleased to report on our activities over the last few months. They have been very busy months as we continue to seek to enrich the education of our children by supporting programs which we feel will improve their educational experience.

We have given over \$20,000 in innovative grants, have supported a pilot program for high school students taking courses at Suffolk Community College, and have funded and helped to realize the new swim program for all 5th graders at Frank P Long Intermediate School. The Clipper Classic Race and Fun Walk celebrated its twentieth anniversary. It was well attended and because of that, we were able to award scholarships to 16 graduating seniors. The Annual Cocktail Party and Auction was a great success and raised a significant amount of our funding, in addition to being a truly enjoyable day. Additionally the Becker/Gambles Music Fund gave out over \$4,000 in scholarships for summer study, presented a wonderful concert in October and is planning the return of the Daedalus Quartet for a concert on May 15.

All these activities require a great deal of work by loyal, dedicated, hard working volunteers and rely on the generosity of our supporters. Many community members have supported our efforts over the years and enabled the foundation to be a success. Thank you all.

The core of the organization is the Board of Directors. The following members have left the board: Steve Laird, Art Cooley, Kathie Dallin, Terry Young and Vinny Lynch. We all thank you for your hard work, we miss you, but we know that you will continue to support our work. Barbara Knowles and Margaret Montemagno have joined the board. The education of our youth is one of the most important, yet difficult activities that a community must accomplish. The demands of today's world require that students know more and perform better than at any time in our his-

Clipper Classic Celebrates 20 Years!

The twentieth annual Clipper Classic was run on July 13, 2003 and saw a new Clipper Classic course record set by Anthony Famiglietti, who crossed the finish line at 14:32:72. The Overall Female Winner was Barbara Gubbins, who came in at 19:02:88. In total, 448 runners and 61 walkers crossed the finish line.

Each year, medals are presented to the first three finishers in each category. This year, to commemorate the 20th Anniversary, a \$20 cash award was presented to the first place finisher in each category. In addition, \$20 was presented to the runner who came in twentieth, as well as the runner who came in closest to 20 minutes. An added award was an offer of \$250, for any male or female who broke the course record. Overall Male Winner Anthony Famiglietti did just that.

At press time, we need to pay a nod to many of the dedicated people who have been coordinating the race for many years and who will be leaving this year. We thank

them, especially Lori Klamut, for raising many thousands of dollars for scholarships for BHS seniors. g *"The Literacy Backpack Program"* at Brookhaven Elementary School, sponsored by Stephanie Miller, Victoria Suarez and Mary Pettit. This project will provide collections of books to students grade level K-3 with parents involved.

g *"Garden Club"* at Frank P. Long Intermediate School, sponsored by Peter Cisek. This ongoing project teaches students about soil makeup, composting, watering, and the enjoyment a garden has to offer. Two more gardens are planned.

g *"Project Earth, Woodworker Club"* at Frank P. Long Intermediate School, sponsored by Peter Cisek. This program teaches skills of measurement, mathematics, hand manipulations, etc. through the building of wood projects.

g *"Reading Buddies"* at Bellport High School, sponsored by Loraine K. McCray, ESL teacher, for the Shared Decision Making HS Team. This project is for freshman students to be matched up with honors students for homework help.

g *"BHS Step Squad"* at Bellport High School, sponsored by Loraine K. McCray. The grant will provide audio equipment for this community-minded organization.

g *"Hands-on Math Manipulatives"* at the Brookhaven Elementary School, sponsored by Nancy Paradise. This "hands-on" project for Kindergarten students is to be integrated with existing literacy and language manipulatives.

g *"Power Hour"* at Boys and Girls Club, submitted by John D. Norris, Executive Director. The club will be instituting a Tutorial/Homework Program to encourage young people to become self-directed learners and assume responsibility for their educational success or failure.

g *"Snuggle up and Read"* evening at Verne W. Critz Elementary School, sponsored by Lorrie D. Collichio, PTA President. Students in grades K-3 will enjoy an evening of storytelling, using decorated classrooms, creating books, while wearing comfy clothes.

g *"BHS Gospel Chorale"* at Bellport High School is sponsored by Margaret Bullock. Students in grades 9-12 who participate in the Chorale will learn the proper singing techniques which will enable them to prepare for choir competition.

g *"East Asian Brush Painting"* at Brookhaven Elementary School, sponsored by Michelle Procida. Sung Sook Setton, a Korean brush artist will give third grade classes instruction in East Asian brush painting. Students will learn about Asia through many activities in art as well as through folk tales, music and much more.

g *"KEEP Book Project"* at Brookhaven Elementary School. This home/school program for Kindergarten students sponsored by Brenda Hernandez provides books for use at home. Parents are encouraged to participate in the program.

g *"Make and Take Workshops"* at Kreamer Street Elementary School, sponsored by Dawn Baynon and Susan Mineo. This program develops literacy skills and fosters a home/school connection.

g *"Super Summer Readers"* at Brookhaven Elementary School, sponsored by Karen Hollowell. This project, for grades 1 and 2, will foster summer reading using books at the students' present level and their next level. A writing journal will be supplied to include a writing component for assessment.

Swim Program for Frank P. Long Fifth Grade Students

Diane Zanazzi came to the foundation a couple of years ago with a folder of newspaper clippings on youth drownings here on Long Island.

She said, "I was shocked and saddened to see stories every summer on the deaths of Long Island children who had died because they had not received basic swimming instruction. I thought that a swim program might qualify for a grant given the foundation's mission of expanding educational opportunities to the students in our district."

After discussion, the board of the foundation did indeed agree to set aside \$10,000 for a pilot program to give swimming lessons to every child in one grade of the district. A committee of Zanazzi, Mary Jane Cullen and Dava Stravinsky met with Frank P. Long Intermediate School principal Annette Maillard, the school's physical education teacher Bonnie Newcomb and parent Angela Kawajrol to formulate a plan to make this idea a reality. The idea was presented to Dr. Michael LaFever whose support gave the group the encouragement to continue the project.

After working out objectives for the program and securing the pool at St. Joseph's College in Patchogue, the

committee received approval from the district's Board of Education to go forward. The district enabled the program to use two minibuses to transport the students from the school to the college. Louise Colletti, director of transportation for the district, kindly assisted by calculating travel times and organizing the use of the buses and drivers.

Scheduling the classes (there are a total of 15 classes with approximately 25 students in each class) was a major undertaking and Gary Dabrusky, assistant principal at F.P. Long, was the key to the successful organization of the program. In addition to the rental of the pool and instructors' fees, the budget for the program included the hiring of two teaching assistants, Darlene Hernandez and Joel Gray. They assist in the locker rooms, with the loading and unloading of students from the minibuses, and at poolside. Parent and community volunteers organized by Gail Glover, president of the F.P. Long PTA, have been present for each day and their service has been so appreciated.

On the first day St. Joseph's Facilities Manager Priscilla Castellano welcomed all of the students to the college and outlined the rules of the pool. Instructors Ms. Newcomb, Lori Dow, and Elaine Messina assessed the students' skills enabling them to break the students into groups for individualized instruction. During the course, the students warmed up by bobbing and blowing bubbles, practiced floating, worked on the crawl and elementary backstrokes, and developed their breathing technique. The course culminated with safety drills; the use of personal flotation devices (PFDs), reaching assists, and introduction to diving. The program has been flexible and challenging enough for each child to improve his or her water skills. To date, five classes have successfully completed six lessons each in the pool. For many, this has been their first opportunity to have swimming lessons.

It has been so exciting to see the progress of the students thus far. We extend our sincere thanks to everyone who has participated and to the donors of the foundation for making this a reality.
