Opera Appreciation Course Offered

Ira Hayes, Ph.D., local resident, educator and opera buff, has generously offered to give a series of opera appreciation classes to benefit the Becker/Gambles Music Fund. From Handel to Strauss, the first of the two eight-week courses is to be held on Monday evenings in May and June at Bellport High School. This course will be an overview of opera from Handel, Mozart, bel canto, French opera, Verdi, Puccini and Wagner. The second course, Verdi and the Romantic Tradition is slated to begin in September and will be held on Thursday evenings.

Ira writes:

I've been hooked on opera for most of my life. As a Columbia College freshman, I went to my first performances at the Met, Puccini's Gianni Schicchi and Richard Strauss' Salome. I was thrilled by the larger-than-life quality—the voices, the orchestra, the size of the audience! I saw five operas that year. The next year, I saw everything I could, getting standing room, joining the line at 5pm, talking to other standees who had seen the great singers and every opera one could think of. I learned opera on that line. I went to more than fifteen operas a year then. I don't go as much now, but I'm still always excited at opera's potential to thrill me the way no other theater can!

Opera is one of the treasures of western civilization. Live from Lincoln Center, the Three Tenors, the Metropolitan Opera's high definition movie theater telecasts have all helped popularize it. More and more people go regularly to the opera, attracted by its vocal Olympics and a blend of music and drama.. Participants in these courses will be even more eager to attend an opera performance and to take advantage of one of the highlights of New York City cultural life.

We thank Ira for his generosity and creativity in suggesting we offer this course as a fundraiser for the Becker/Gambles Music Fund. Under the supervision of Sonia Orfin and Alissa Connell the courtyard project at Brookhaven Elementary School is in full swing. The staff recently participated in a courtyard clean-up with parents and children on hand to help out. Using kid-sized gardening sets purchased with grant monies from SCEF, they weeded, edged

flower beds and helped prepare the grounds for planting. Once it gets warmer, frogs and lily pads will be added to the pond. Butterfly feeders will also be installed, and the classes will be able to release their butterflies into the courtyard. Teachers started vegetable seeds in their classrooms with the root-viewing kits, and these vegetables will be planted. Many resources have been added to the book room and library about insect and animal life cycles that teachers and students can borrow. Students as Cool Tool Creators

Fourth grade students from Frank P. Long Intermediate School visited the Long Island Children's Museum as part of a grant titled "Students as Cool Tool Creators."

The museum is an interactive facility and a not-for-profit organization chartered by the New York State Board of Regents. Students had the opportunity to learn about map making through powerful and motivating hands-on activities. They also learned about graphing and how to construct their own treasure maps. The museum seamlessly integrates New York State Board of Regents standards of math, science, technology, English language arts, Social Studies and career development into its activities.

BHS Science Project

The Bellport High School OSSP has gotten off to its spring start with two fantastic juniors who have volunteered to spend time after school and during the summer break. Both Eric Hernandez and Ian Lundstrom have started their observations of Beaver Dam Creek at several points. They have initially started to record air temperature, water temperature, local weather conditions at the time of data collection, cataloging any visible animal life and GPS locations for sample collection. In the near future they will start to take dissolved oxygen readings, salt concentrations and several other variables in addition to water samples so they may look at the plankton populations.

We have high hopes to represent BHS this year at Brookhaven National Labs OSSP night set for the start of June. The evening is a science symposium of all the local Long Island school districts that are involved in the program. A night that allows the students involved to show case their environmental observations. I will keep you posted and send you literature and pictures once the event has passed. —JOHN ROMASHKO, III

SPRING GRANT CYCLE TOPS \$22,000 AGAIN!

Reading, Writing and Wii in Spring Grant Program. The South Country Education Foundation awarded more than \$22,000 to projects in science, reading, art and physical education. A record number of applications was received for special school projects, but the SCEF board was forced to leave unfunded many worthwhile and innovative projects.

Summer Swimming Lessons \$1,600.00 Tracie Van Dina Boys & Girls Club of the Bellport Area

Digital cameras will be a tool to encourage first graders to create stories about their surroundings, peers and families. Students will be trained in the use of the cameras and, with parental permission, will take photographs that apply to particular themes. The applicants indicate that the pictures will be used to enhance the writing experience. The grant will fund the purchase of five digital cameras as well as carrying cases, SD cards and batteries.

Lorena Salcedo-Watson will be an artist in residence at the Brookhaven Elementary School and will offer printmaking instruction to the student body. Students will then create prints using a variety of materials, both traditional and unconventional. The program will conclude with a school-wide art show. The grant money will pay the \$1,500 artist fee.

This grant is for the purchase of a tabletop buzzer system for the school's Science Bowl Team. The buzzer system will help simulate competition events enhancing the performance of the team.

This grant is for the purchase of the Nintendo Wii video game system for use by the phys-Development for Adaptive PE ical therapist at the Middle School as well as for students enrolled in Adaptive Physical Education. The video program will help students develop motor coordination, balance and muscle strength. In addition to the purchase of the Nintendo Wii, the applicant will purchase games and a lockable cart.

> Fifth grade students in Cluster A will be given a guided tour by Fire Island National Seashore rangers of Sunken Forest and the museum at Sailor's Haven on Fire Island. They will learn about the centuries-old forest and the endangered species that live on Fire Island and in surrounding waters. The grant will fund two buses to transport 100 students, teachers and chaperones to the Sayville Ferry Terminal as well as the ferry passage to Fire Island. The program is being considered for all fifth grade students next year.

Reading and writing skills will be honed by all first graders in the district as they create "Book Blogs." Topics for the blogs will be taken from the district reading series. Students will write their blogs at home using special materials and with input from their parents. The grant will provide for the purchase of writing books with spaces for illustrations, book bags, card stock, and other supplies. The students will also learn book binding technique. The end products will become part of the classroom library.

The Boys & Girls Club of the Bellport Area will use this grant to take 30 club members for 10 swimming lessons at the Holtsville Pool. The swimming program is offered by the Town of Brookhaven. The Foundation will cover Brookhaven Town recreational fees of \$1,500.00 and \$100 for the purchase of bathing suits for participants who need them.

The Character Counts committee at the Verne W. Critz Elementary School hopes to increase the physical activities of its students on the playground while decreasing student conflicts. With the SCEF grant it will purchase a Peaceful Playground Program Kit which includes blueprints for the design of permanent playground activities such as hopscotch, four square and basketball. The nationally tested program has been proven to reduce playground conflicts through the implementation of organized activities.

Students will learn valuable lessons about the environment through the recycling of plastics, metal cans, glass and paper. The grant will pay for digital and spring scales to be used by students to weigh recyclable products. Students will collect data and use statistical methods to analyze materials and patterns of waste reduction. They will also make posters encouraging students and faculty to participate.

Students in the Frank P. Long Intermediate School Garden Club will plant a Japanese maple, five flats of flowers and install birdhouses and hanging plants in the school's courtyard. The Garden Club is a project supervised by Peter Cisek with dozens of participants who plant mums in the fall and organize other seasonal displays. The grant also covers the purchase of rakes, work gloves, mulch, potting soil, courtyard ornaments and bird feed.

Students will use rulers, tools and project design elements to create at least seven woodcraft projects within a 30-week period. There are approximately 125 members of the Woodworkers Club. The club is so popular that meetings are held before school and during lunch period to accommodate the large enrollment. Birdhouses, sitting benches for the courtyard and corner shelves are among the projects. The grant will be used to purchase chopsaw and jigsaw blades, a table saw, wood and various other supplies.

This grant will supply materials needed for the Circus Arts program. The program is designed as a two-week gym program and will reach all students. The needed equipment includes manipulative devil sticks, plastic spinning plates, diabolo balance sticks, juggling scarves and walking stilts. According to the applicant, Circus Art Programs encourage self-confidence, self-discipline, balance, hand-eye, hand-foot coordination, all in a non-competitive environment.

This grant provides for the purchase of a Dell Vostro laptop computer and two handheld GPS devices and training to be used by members of Students for Environmental Quality collecting data on undocumented waste and sewer run-off. The collected data will be used to identify the sources of troubling run-off and design corrective measures.

Career Day at Brookhaven This grant is designed to expose female high school students to careers in science. The grant calls for two field trips. The first is to BNL for its annual High School Career Day, funded by BNL's Women in Science and coordinated by Stony Brook University's Women in Science and Engineering program. The second trip is for students to take part in the BNL Open Space Stewardship Program and to participate in stewardship activities. Approximately \$1,700 of the grant is for passenger vans to take 20 students and chaperones to the event. The balance of the grant pays for materials, journals, kits and supplies for participating students.

> Two fourth grade classes will travel to Atlantis Marine World to explore the science of archaeology during a hands-on interactive program. This trip will enable students to analyze data and form opinions about civilizations and cultures based on this information. The trip will blend educational components of science and social studies. In addition to participating in an archaeological dig, the students will also tour the marine museum. The grant pays for bus transportation and admission.
