Students will utilize the books during independent reading, Reader's Workshop, and book clubs. Playaway books give any student the ability to read (and listen to) any book. While the students are listening to the audio book, they follow along with a hard copy, thus building comprehension skills. Students with disabilities and learning challenges will have more opportunities to interact with higher level texts as well as with their peers.

PAPERCRAFT WITH TIFA CHII VISITING ARTIST RESIDENCY

Tifa Chii, a Hong Kong born, New York City trained paper artist, will present and share her work in person to all art classes at the Verne W. Critz Elementary School. The student population at V.W.C. School is approximately 265 students, and all will benefit from meeting a professional artist in small groups, seeing her work in person, and asking questions about her career path. During her residency, she will present to each classroom for a 40-minute period. After her residency, art teacher Lealand Richard will work with the students on a 4-5 class period art project in collage and cut-paper inspired by the techniques and whimsical style of Tifa Chii's work. These may include paper castles inspired by 2050's Disney imagery (one of Tifa's great inspirations), animals, and nature themes. These projects will then be displayed at the end-of-year art shows, both district-wide and building specific.

ROBOTICS CODING: AN UNFORGETTABLE STEM EXPERIENCE

As society innovates and technology advances, the need for professionals who understand how these technologies work and who can propose practical solutions continues to grow. This program will give students in the primary grades experience with a curriculum that is enriched and integrated with STEM activities. (STEM education helps to bridge the ethnic and gender gaps sometimes found in math and science fields. Initiatives have been established to increase the roles of women and minorities in STEM-related fields.) Fifth grade students will have the opportunity to explore and experience STEM activities that connect to their lives and inspire and motivate them to pursue the growing field. They will work with a partner to use coding and design to build, program and test a robot. In addition, students will engage in productive struggle as they make multiple attempts, take risks, engage in discourse with other classmates, and use innovative ways to redesign and test their model. Finally, this project can be shared with other fifth grade classes as the robots can be reprogrammed and coded again. Each student will create a digital presentation to be used as a self-assessment of their learning which can be used when presenting our experience to the board when we are finished.

HOME SWEET HOME CENTER

Home Sweet Home will be a play-based educational center in the classroom. The students will build vocabulary, improve their problem-solving skills and review some math skills. The purpose is to create a positive environment where students will think outside the box. The center will change monthly and will include a pizza shop, a restaurant, and a bakery. The materials include fake food, a cash register, and money, as well as accessories for the center. These activities will align with our social, emotional curriculum as well as building the children's vocabulary and math skills.

SENSORY PLAYGROUND

The plan is to set this interactive play up in an enclosed outdoor courtyard area. This sensory playground would include the following areas: music in nature, a dinosaur dig, hands on exploration and nature games. The outdoor learning environment would be designed to be a safe, inclusive and organized place for all these areas of play, music, learning and fun.

TEEN THEME BOOK CLUB

This grant provides for a nine-month book club that would meet weekly, including summer months, to assist with ongoing socialization and academic literacy outside of the school environment. Outreach for the program will be done between the Boys and Girls Club of the Bellport area's social work interns and the Bellport High School Librarian and social work staff, identifying those students who would benefit from peer social interaction, literary skills, and processing of trauma and developmental challenges faced by youth today. Teen Book Club will be led by Phatima Mitchell, a certified school librarian and educator, through her non-profit, A Journey With Words.

LIFE SKILLS FIELD TRIPS

This grant would provide students in the 12:1:1 and the 12:1:4 classes at the high school, the opportunity to develop educationally, socially and professionally outside the classrooms by attending field trips to the following locations: Coram Bowling Alley, Cafe Castello, and Coastal Steward Marine Education Program at Cedar Beach. The 12:1:1 and 12:1:4 classes offered at the high school are designed to develop and maintain necessary skills for the students to be functioning members of society. The experiences these students would gain attending these field trips, complement the academic studies and address the NYS Standards of Career Development, Integrated Learning, Universal Foundation Skills, and Career Majors.

LIFE SKILLS FIELD TRIPS

In addition, students will be reading and ordering lunch from a menu at California Pizza Kitchen. A trip to Bayport Flower House would involve a tour and observation of the day to day operation of this business. Students will be given the opportunity to create a bouquet of flowers to bring home. This program will complete academic activities by addressing the following NYS standards: Career Development, Integrated Learning, Universal foundation Skills, and Career Majors.

JOURNALING FOR SELF CARE AND CREATIVE EXPRESSION

CULTIVATING MULTICULTURAL REPRESENTATION AND BILITERACY IN DUAL LANGUAGE LIBRARIES

BELLPORT HIGH SCHOOL JAZZ ENSEMBLE MASTERCLASS AND PERFORMANCE AT THE JAZZ LOFT

KIDS IN THE GARDEN

LONG ISLAND AQUATIC LIFE AND LOCAL VALUABLE ESTUARIES

Frank P. Long Intermediate School Fifth graders will attend a field trip to the Long Island Aquarium where they will be engaged in interactive displays and programs, get a behind the scenes tour and attend an educational program called "Our Valuable Estuary". Students' imaginations will be unleashed as the field trip emphasizes the importance of marine life and environmental preservation. We will be attending an educational program titled Our Valuable Estuary where they will recognize estuaries as critical for the survival of many species that depend on the estuary as places to live, feed and reproduce. They will learn about our own Peconic Estuary which has been designated an "Estuary of National significance." Funding for this field trip includes the cost of busing, entrance into Long Island Aquarium, a behind the scenes tour and an educational program for all 5th grade students. There are 299 students in the fifth grade at this time.

CHROMEBOOKS IN THE CLASSROOM
